Introduction

This form provides a written record of decisions relating to the allocation of extra funding received from the Hertfordshire Health Protection Board. Decisions to award were taken on 1/9/2021. The authorising officer was Nick Phipps, Community Wellbeing and Partnerships Service Manager, in consultation with Cllr Jonathan Kaye, portfolio holder responsible for grant giving. These applications were recommended for funding because it was demonstrated that the organisation was and is part of containing Coronavirus and preventing the disease from impacting our residents and communities and also helps to take forward the council's priorities for grant giving.

Applications have been through our due diligence checks, assessed in terms of benefit and have been discussed and agreed by the Grants Panel.

Herts FASD (Foetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder) Support Network	Rebuilding FASD Support in East Herts - in response to upcoming NICE Quality Standard to adopt greater professionalism and capacity to cope with the wave of new cases expected as diagnosis becomes much more common, and the need for post-diagnostic care and support pathways grows exponentially. The grant will cover costs of rent, insurance, and 6 parental support networks/FASD social clubs at Southern Maltings. The network provides a place for mutual assistance by people who understand the struggles of raising children with FASD and want to help each other be strong.	£2,220	Part fund as delivery is county wide; however, 60% of clients are in EH and are vulnerable. This will enable us to more efficiently and effectively deliver person-led services - putting our service users in charge of their own growth, capabilities to work, to learn, to live independently and fully realise their potential. Grove Cottage (Bishop's Stortford Mencap)	Adapting Grove Cottage's service delivery due to the COVID-19 pandemic (joined "Operation CommUNITY") - using grant to pay for rent, PPE, IT and extra cleaning in order to provide the right support, so that people with learning disabilities can live independent and fulfilled lives.	£6,000	Part fund as applicant had received a COVID Small Business Grant. PowWER	Trauma Training Herts Help Advisors - to offer much needed trauma training to our 16 first responders in our Herts Help telephone support line. The proposed training will act as a protective factor for our staff and organization as we recognize the impact that the pandemic has had on front line staff. In 2021, we have so far supported 3,520 marginalized, vulnerable and socially excluded East Herts residents - speaking for them when they can't and supporting them to speak for themselves when they can.	£1,000	Part fund as delivery is county wide. B Green Store CIC	A local store and community hub - to reduce rural/social isolation in the village and nearby areas by activating local spaces and organising weekly activities that will target vulnerable adults which start and finish in at B.Green and will include refreshments after the activity to strengthen social connections.	£6,717	Part fund as applicant had received Small Business Grant and bid was weak on sustainability and consultation /feedback. However Panel noted that the shop volunteers had provided a fantastic COVID response effort and was clearly a grass roots group that was embedded in community. 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Broxbourne and East Herts CVS – Hertford Skills Hub	Hertford Community Skills Hub - to cover rental costs to allow us to continue to provide courses free of charge, ensuring that cost is not a barrier to participation. This grant will enable us to keep the hub open, providing a venue for face-to-face support.	£4,702	Part fund as lower scoring bid which was considered weak across the board (lacking in substance and clarity). Panel was concerned that there was no evidence of demand. It recommended that the applicant consider a nominal fee to learners - which is considered best practice - and would make up project shortfall for rental costs. On the condition, they register on the East Herts Lottery to raise income for the Skills Hub and become more sustainable
Furneux Pelham School Association	FPSA Outdoor Development Plan - fun outside maximise its potential for offering a wide variety of outdoor activities with the addition of a Zig Zag Free Standing Traversing Wall. To purchase equipment for our new status as a Forest School.	£4,500	Part fund as lower scoring bid with gaps in consultation, sustainability, delivery and little evidence of COVID response. However, panel agreed the project had merit due to funds raised through Just Giving and agreed to match what had been raised via the crowd. On the condition that group explains how the wider community will gain access to the equipment after school hours and during the holidays.
